Magna Eastern European Fund NAV grew by 12.75% in 2Q25 and +16.6% (C Class Shares) year-to-date from stock-picks in Greece, Cyprus, the Balkans and Poland while the recent addition of Turkish positions is expected to deliver another leg of performance going into 2H25.

Greece has been one of our strongest performing allocations this year, driven by a combination of solid macro progress, a regained investment-grade rating, and clear bottom-up bank improvements. Alpha Bank and Piraeus Bank have both executed substantial balance sheet clean-ups, slashing non-performing exposures from crisis-era highs to low single digits. Both have strengthened capital buffers and are focused on digital expansion and SME lending growth, areas that should continue to support earnings momentum. Their strategies are now firmly geared toward shareholder returns: cost-to-income ratios are declining, loan growth remains healthy, and CET1 levels comfortably cover future dividend plans. Valuations remain attractive at ~0.6–0.7x P/B, still below EU peers, leaving room for a further rerating. Bank of Cyprus, while outside Greece, benefits from similar structural tailwinds: strong GDP growth, resilient tourism, and disciplined provisioning. Together, these banks stand out for the quality of their loan books and robust liquidity positions, with the next catalyst being second-half earnings releases, which should reinforce high-teens ROTE targets and confirm plans for enhanced capital returns.

Poland continues to demonstrate resilience within Eastern Europe. GDP is set to grow around 3% this year, with domestic demand, infrastructure spending, and EU funds providing multiple tailwinds. Diagnostyka, our key name in the Polish healthcare space, has performed strongly thanks to its market leadership in medical diagnostics. Its strategy focuses on consolidating a fragmented market, growing direct-to-consumer testing, and investing in cutting-edge technology to widen margins. Year-to-date revenue and EBITDA growth remain in the double digits, supported by strong cash flows and minimal net debt. Despite this, Diagnostyka trades at a discount to European lab peers, offering upside potential as it continues bolt-on acquisitions. The outlook is underpinned by increasing consumer focus on preventive healthcare and chronic disease management — secular trends that are largely unaffected by short-term macro headwinds.

Poland's banks, particularly Pekao and PKO BP, have also delivered strong performance year-to-date, driven by resilient macro fundamentals, healthy balance sheets, and clear tailwinds from supportive monetary and fiscal dynamics. Both institutions have benefited from Poland's robust GDP growth, which continues to outpace much of Europe thanks to solid domestic consumption, EU investment flows, and resilient credit demand. Pekao and PKO have successfully managed through interest rate volatility, maintaining healthy net interest margins while demonstrating disciplined cost control. Non-performing loan ratios remain among the lowest in the region, reflecting prudent risk management and a conservative approach to retail and SME lending. Strategically, both banks are increasingly focused on digital transformation and product cross-selling, supporting fee income growth alongside traditional interest revenue. Capital buffers remain well above regulatory requirements, providing ample room for consistent dividends and, in the case of PKO, selective expansion in value-accretive lending segments. Valuations still look compelling at around 0.9–1.1x P/B, below Western European peers despite higher structural returns on equity. Looking ahead, the next catalyst will be further clarity on monetary easing in Poland, which should support asset quality and credit expansion, while upcoming results should confirm the sector's ability to sustain double-digit ROE and attractive shareholder distributions.

Together, Pekao and PKO remain core holdings within our Eastern Europe allocation, combining strong fundamentals, resilient funding, and clear levers for continued growth.

In the Balkans, Adriatic Metals has emerged as one of our more compelling holdings this year, reflecting the successful transition from developer to producer, underpinned by world-class resource quality and disciplined project delivery. The company's flagship Vares Silver Project in Bosnia & Herzegovina is now fully commissioned, positioning Adriatic as Europe's newest low-cost silver-zinc-lead producer with exceptionally high grades and strong economics. First concentrate shipments commenced earlier this year, marking a major de-risking milestone that the market has responded to positively. Strategically, Adriatic Metals is focused on maximising cash flow generation and rapidly paying down its modest project debt, while simultaneously expanding its resource base through aggressive exploration of extensions around Vares. The project's high-grade orebody supports industry-leading margins, while its location in the heart of Europe gives it strategic relevance as supply chains look to secure critical metals closer to home. Balance sheet discipline has been a key strength: Adriatic has kept capital costs tightly under control, with ramp-up progressing ahead of schedule and production guidance reaffirmed. The company's low-cost structure means it can deliver robust free cash flow even at conservative silver and base metal price assumptions. Valuation remains attractive versus global peers, trading at a discount to the NAV of its producing reserves and with further upside potential as new resource upgrades and satellite discoveries extend mine life. Looking ahead, the next key catalyst will be the first full quarter of commercial production, which should demonstrate consistent concentrate quality, positive cash flow, and balance sheet deleveraging.

Turkey has been a notable bright spot this quarter, driven by an increasingly credible macro reset, which is restoring confidence among investors after years of unorthodox policy. The appointment of a new, orthodox central banker and a technocratic economic team has been a turning point, signalling a clear commitment to stabilising the Turkish Lira, taming inflation, and gradually normalising monetary policy. Recent headline inflation has begun to decelerate from peak levels, helped by tighter financial conditions, a return to more predictable policy communication, and early signs of currency stabilisation. While policy rates remain high for now, the market is starting to price in a gradual easing cycle as disinflation gains traction, a backdrop that is inherently supportive for Turkey's well-capitalised private banks. Among these, Akbank stands out as one of the best-managed Turkish banks, with a strong retail and corporate lending franchise, a conservatively managed loan book, and robust capital buffers that exceed Basel requirements by a healthy margin. Year-to-date, Akbank has delivered solid earnings growth despite the high-rate environment, thanks to disciplined cost control, stable asset quality, and a resilient funding base driven by its dominant retail deposit share. The bank's net interest margins are well-positioned to benefit from a gradual rate reduction cycle, as funding costs ease and credit growth slowly reaccelerates. Its balance sheet remains highly liquid, with prudent provisioning that gives investors confidence in the bank's ability to weather any near-term volatility as reforms bed in. Valuation remains compelling for a franchise of this quality, still trading at deeply discounted multiples (~0.4–0.5x P/B) compared to regional peers, yet with a clear pathway to double-digit returns on equity as macro conditions normalise. The next catalyst will be further evidence of sustained disinflation, accompanied by measured rate cuts that should help drive a positive re-rating across the Turkish banking sector.

From a valuation perspective, the fund is currently trading at 8.5 times forward price-to-earnings, with expected earnings growth exceeding 20%. This represents a discount to its benchmark, which trades at 8.8 times forward earnings while forecasting approximately 10% earnings growth.

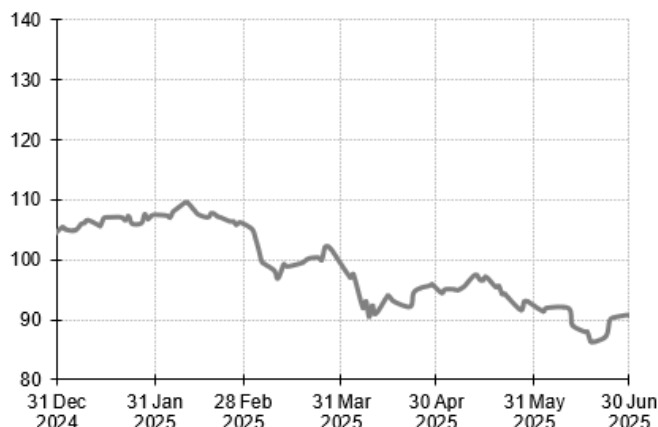

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Year-to-date, the Magna MENA (N Acc) Fund's NAV is down 13.1% in EUR terms. It's important to highlight that currency effects have amplified this figure as nearly all Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC) currencies in Saudi Arabia, Qatar, UAE and Bahrain are pegged to the USD, and around 95% of our portfolio is allocated to these markets. This makes our performance naturally sensitive to EUR/USD moves, which can mask the underlying resilience of the companies we own.

From a market dynamics perspective, the outdated narrative that GCC equities are purely oil-driven no longer holds. The correlation between crude oil prices and our MENA strategy, for example, has fallen sharply from 0.70 in 2015–2021 to just 0.30 since 2021 as the region's economies and markets have diversified meaningfully. Saudi Arabia, for instance, now generates 40% of its government revenues from non-oil sectors and its pipeline of mega and giga projects (Qiddiya, Neom, Riyadh Expo 2030, FIFA World Cup 2034) remains a powerful anchor for long-term growth.

From a spending standpoint, governments have ample fiscal headroom to deliver on these commitments, with Saudi debt per gross domestic product (GDP) at just ~28% and significant sovereign wealth firepower behind them. Private sector activity also remains robust, with Saudi bank lending to the private sector up 15.2% Year-over-Year (YoY) as of April, and an active pipeline of new IPOs from real estate and healthcare to airlines and renewable energy.

Nonetheless, investors fearing the weaker USD, oil prices and fiscal outlook for the region punished stocks in the portfolio which further dislocates their prices to fundamentals. Arabian Pipes has faced project delays in pipeline contracts, but its strategic position remains intact as the region continues to invest heavily in energy infrastructure. Its valuation is now deeply discounted, with the next major catalyst likely to be new contract awards later this year. Middle East Speciality Cables has struggled with margin pressures and project delays yet remains fundamentally tied to the region's multi-year grid upgrades and energy transition. As project execution normalises, we see meaningful upside from margin recovery.

Tasheel has underperformed amid softer consumer demand and peak interest rates, but the structural growth story for consumer finance in Saudi Arabia is intact. Its disciplined underwriting, low Non-Performing Loans (NPL), and niche positioning leave it well placed to benefit as rate cuts come through and household spending stabilises.

Nonetheless, we saw some strong contributors across the region. Gulf Marine Services (GMS) has performed strongly, benefitting from rising offshore oil, gas and renewables activity. With higher day rates, solid fleet utilisation and disciplined cost control, GMS is now seeing improved earnings momentum and further deleveraging, positioning it well for a continued re-rating. Label Vie, Morocco’s leading food retailer, has delivered resilient returns thanks to robust consumer demand and its multi-format store strategy. Strong same-store sales, stable margins and disciplined expansion underpin its leadership, with its Carrefour partnership adding further supply chain strength. Commercial International Bank (CIB) Egypt continues to execute exceptionally well, growing earnings at double-digit rates even through macro volatility. Its strong capital base, prudent risk management and leadership in Egypt’s private banking market leave it well placed to capture renewed credit demand as the macro cycle improves.

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Fiera Emerging Markets’ NAV has risen by 14.6% this quarter, outperforming the MSCI Emerging Markets Index by 7.7% (N Class shares) over the same period. This strong absolute and relative performance has been underpinned by effective stock selection in South Korea, Taiwan, Brazil, and Greece, where our positioning has benefited from a combination of macro, structural, and company-specific catalysts. Although Vietnam has been a modest drag on returns so far this year, we expect the recent improvement in trade dynamics and the policy environment to help normalise performance and boost foreign investor sentiment in the second half, particularly as the market continues to position itself for a potential upgrade to FTSE Emerging Markets status.

Korea has been one of our most rewarding allocations this year, reflecting our ability to position early for what has become one of Asia’s most promising structural equity stories: the “Value Up” reform agenda. This policy initiative is fundamentally reshaping corporate governance, capital efficiency, and shareholder returns across the Korean market — with meaningful tailwinds for investors who are selective and engaged on the ground. Our team’s deep local relationships and rigorous company research enabled us to identify key beneficiaries well ahead of the broader market. This helped us capitalise on the initial re-rating as the “Value Up” framework gathered real policy traction. Recent election results have only strengthened our conviction that this reform is not just rhetorical but an economic necessity, given Korea’s structural demographic challenges and pension funding pressures. The new President has been very vocal about pushing through the next stage of reforms. Policymakers and business leaders alike now recognise that unlocking trapped corporate value is essential to attract sustainable foreign and domestic capital.

A clear example of how we channelled this theme is our position in KB Financial, Korea’s leading diversified financial group. KB has demonstrated strong capital discipline, high credit quality, and steady earnings growth, supported by a solid retail franchise and underappreciated non-bank operations such as broking and insurance. Its capital ratios remain comfortably above regulatory requirements, giving it ample capacity to raise dividends and execute share buybacks — exactly the shareholder-friendly actions the “Value Up” framework promotes. Valuations for KB remain undemanding at just 0.65x P/B, providing tangible upside as further capital return plans are announced. Importantly, our local presence continues to surface other compelling opportunities outside financials. For example, Hyundai Electric is benefitting from global trends like the US grid modernisation drive, which has created a record order backlog that should support revenues and margin expansion for years to come. This kind of niche, structural exposure complements our “Value Up” core, adding further breadth to our Korea positioning.

In short, we believe Korea’s reform momentum, attractive starting valuations, and company-specific catalysts still offer a clear path for outperformance relative to both the region and global EM. We see rising foreign inflows, bipartisan policy support, and constructive capital market activity carrying through into 2025, as more companies step up with higher dividends, more buybacks, and active restructuring. Together, this backdrop supports our view that Korea remains a high-conviction overweight — a rare blend of structural reform and idiosyncratic upside with real follow-through.

Looking at the next twelve months, we expect our increasingly constructive view on Brazil to gradually be reflected in the portfolio. The 100%+ market rally in 2016 provides a clear case study for why we should be paying more attention to opportunities here. The market is poised to benefit from a favourable macro inflection, and supportive domestic catalysts with a probable exit of President Lula in elections next year. With systemic interest rates now widely viewed as having peaked, the focus has shifted toward a gradual easing cycle — a dynamic that historically unlocks meaningful upside for well-positioned local equities. The upcoming election cycle next year should also drive greater policy clarity and market activity, encouraging fresh capital flows into quality companies aligned with Brazil's reform and investment priorities.

Against this backdrop, we've positioned the portfolio with a balance of defensiveness and clear optionality. In the utilities space, COPEL (Companhia Paranaense de Energia) remains a core holding that exemplifies this approach. COPEL is a high-quality, integrated utilities business with a strong asset base in generation and distribution, benefitting from predictable cash flows and rising energy prices. Recent governance improvements including its privatisation process and moves to align shareholder interests have strengthened transparency, efficiency, and dividend visibility, all of which have underpinned a steady rerating. Despite its robust balance sheet and improving profitability, COPEL still trades at an attractive discount relative to regional peers, offering a defensive 12% yield and structural growth through tariff reviews and new projects as Brazil continues to modernise its energy grid. In financials, BTG Pactual remains another high-conviction position. As one of Brazil's leading independent investment banks and asset managers, BTG continues to deliver strong returns on equity and consistent earnings growth, even in a high-rate environment that has challenged more traditional lenders. Its diversified revenue streams — spanning investment banking, trading, wealth management, and private credit — provide resilience while giving BTG clear leverage to benefit as borrowing costs decline and deal activity picks up. The bank's capital discipline and best-in-class governance standards position it well to gain share as domestic and regional markets deepen.

Together, these positions reflect our view that Brazil's equity market offers compelling relative value at this point in the cycle. The combination of peak policy rates, improving inflation trends, and a pivotal election next year should unlock catalysts for selective, high-quality companies with strong balance sheets and shareholder-aligned strategies. We remain focused on companies like COPEL and BTG Pactual that combine quality, and tangible upside to growth and valuation as Brazil's next macro phase takes shape.

In Smaller Emerging Markets, Greece has been one of our strongest performing allocations this year, driven by a combination of solid macro progress, a regained investment-grade rating, and clear bottom-up bank improvements. Piraeus Bank has executed a substantial balance sheet clean-up, slashing non-performing exposures from crisis-era highs to low single digits. The bank has strengthened capital buffers and is focused on digital expansion and SME lending growth — areas that should continue to support earnings momentum. Their strategy is now firmly geared toward shareholder returns: cost-to-income ratios are declining, loan growth remains healthy, and CET1 levels comfortably cover future dividend plans. Valuations remain attractive at ~0.6–0.7x P/B, still below EU peers, leaving room for a further rerating.

In short, we see Vietnam as firmly positioned to extend its recovery and remain one of the most compelling structural growth stories in Southeast Asia.

FPT Corporation, our largest position in Vietnam, remains a compelling stock pick right now because it combines strong fundamentals with clear macro tailwinds. As Vietnam's leading IT services and technology company, it directly benefits from the country's improving trade outlook and ongoing role as a trusted outsourcing hub. Its balance sheet is robust, growth remains in double digits, and its domestic telecoms and education businesses add resilience through steady local demand. After recent underperformance, FPT now trades at an attractive valuation with visible catalysts ahead including new contract wins, a rebound in global IT spending, and renewed foreign inflows as Vietnam's market continues to re-rate. Together, these factors position FPT to capture the country's structural growth story as sentiment normalises.

Emerging Markets have had a well-known growth and valuation advantage over Developed Nations for the last decade. However, the current global environment may at last offer a chance to unlock some of that value with the one-way bet on the US and the dollar seemingly coming to an end. We see an exciting mix of opportunities ranging from very country specific catalysts such as those mentioned in Korea and Brazil, to other areas such as Taiwan, Vietnam and certain Chinese companies enjoying strong demand for their exports and manufacturing capabilities more geared to the wider global economy. Even after the rally this year, we see plenty of mispriced growth and quality across our markets.

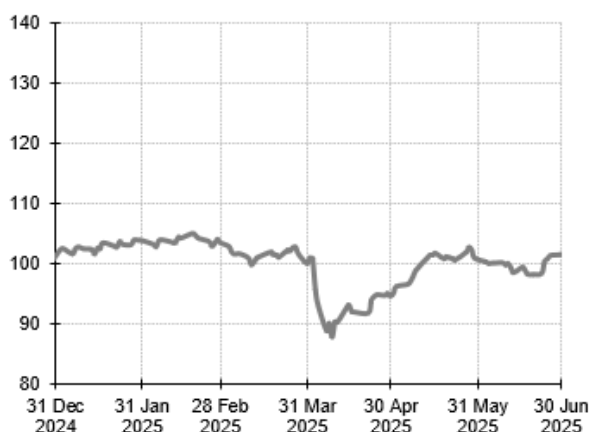

Magna New Frontier's NAV grew by 0.2% (N Class Shares) in 2Q25, taking the total performance of the Fund to 1.4%. This was supported by standout contributions from Greece, where Alpha Bank and Piraeus Bank have delivered strong balance sheet improvements and remain attractively valued, as well as robust stock selection in Poland and Romania. In Vietnam, easing tariff risks and resilient macro fundamentals continue to reinforce our positive outlook, while we maintain a constructive long-term view on the GCC despite recent softness in Saudi equities.

Greece has been one of our strongest performing allocations this year, driven by a combination of solid macro progress, a regained investment-grade rating, and clear bottom-up bank improvements. Alpha Bank and Piraeus Bank have both executed substantial balance sheet clean-ups, slashing non-performing exposures from crisis-era highs to low single digits. Both have strengthened capital buffers and are focused on digital expansion and SME lending growth — areas that should continue to support earnings momentum. Their strategies are now firmly geared toward shareholder returns: cost-to-income ratios are declining, loan growth remains healthy, and CET1 levels comfortably cover future dividend plans. Valuations remain attractive at ~0.6–0.7x P/B, still below EU peers, leaving room for a further rerating. Bank of Cyprus, while outside Greece, benefits from similar structural tailwinds: strong GDP growth, resilient tourism, and disciplined provisioning. Together, these banks stand out for the quality of their loan books and robust liquidity positions, with the next catalyst being second-half earnings releases, which should reinforce high-teens ROTE targets and confirm plans for enhanced capital returns.

Poland continues to demonstrate resilience within Eastern Europe. GDP is set to grow around 3% this year, with domestic demand, infrastructure spending, and EU funds providing multiple tailwinds. Diagnostyka, our key name in the Polish healthcare space, has performed strongly thanks to its market leadership in medical diagnostics. Its strategy focuses on consolidating a fragmented market, growing direct-to-consumer testing, and investing in cutting-edge technology to widen margins. Year-to-date revenue and EBITDA growth remain in the double digits, supported by strong cash flows and minimal net debt. Despite this, Diagnostyka trades at a discount to European lab peers, offering upside potential as it continues bolt-on acquisitions. The outlook is underpinned by increasing consumer focus on preventive healthcare and chronic disease management — secular trends that are largely unaffected by short-term macro headwinds.

In Romania, Purcari Wineries experienced strong upward price action, driven by its solid market position as a leading premium wine producer in Central and Eastern Europe, its consistent profitability, and its clear commitment to shareholder returns through dividends. This strength attracted Maspex, a leading Polish multinational food and beverage company, which announced a voluntary tender offer at RON 21 per share— - representing a meaningful premium to the pre-announcement price and highlighting the strategic value of Purcari's brand and growth prospects. With key insiders agreeing to tender part of their holdings while remaining in operational leadership, the fund stands to benefit from immediate upside via the offer, alongside the potential for sustained long-term value creation as the company leverages Maspex's scale and distribution capabilities to further expand its premium portfolio across the region.

On the other hand, Saudi equities have lagged this year, reflecting investor caution amid a combination of a weaker US dollar and softer oil prices, which have raised near-term questions about fiscal balances across the Gulf Cooperation Council (GCC). That said, we remain firmly constructive on the region's long-term fundamentals and its structural investment case. The GCC economies continue to demonstrate remarkable resilience, underpinned by strong sovereign balance sheets, ample foreign reserves, and some of the lowest debt-to-GDP ratios globally. Saudi Arabia's Vision 2030 reform agenda remains a major catalyst, driving meaningful economic diversification and expanding non-oil revenue streams, which now account for approximately 40% of total government income — a significant buffer that has reduced the local equity market's historical sensitivity to oil price swings. Importantly, private sector momentum remains robust: private lending growth is healthy, construction and infrastructure projects continue at pace, and sectors like tourism and housing are seeing steady investment inflows. Against this backdrop, our exposure remains focused on high-quality companies with resilient balance sheets, clear earnings visibility, and strong alignment with the Kingdom's reform-driven growth priorities.

From a valuation perspective, the fund is currently trading at 9.5 times forward price-to-earnings, with expected earnings growth exceeding 20%. This represents a discount to its benchmark, which trades at 10 times forward earnings while forecasting approximately 6% earnings growth.

The Fiera Capital Global Equity Strategy was down in absolute performance and underperformed its benchmark in the first half of 2025. As for relative underperformance, security selection within the Communication Services, Financials and Health Care sectors were the primary negative drivers. Offsetting this was positive security selection within the Information Technology and Consumer Discretionary sectors.

Ongoing tariff pressures, including the US government cost cutting program, the Russia-Ukraine conflict, and weaker consumer confidence, has led to increased volatility to start the year. With fleeting US military support for traditional allies, European Aerospace & Defense and related companies rallied. European banks also outperformed as the yield curve steepened creating more accommodative conditions for the sector. The emergence of Chinese-based DeepSeek, along with potential effects from policy uncertainty led to a selloff in many of the big winners from 2023-2024, predominantly US technology companies and the beneficiaries of AI. Meanwhile, the European Central Bank (ECB) continued cutting rates at its March meeting, and developed international equities outperformed. Global equity markets experienced a severe, short-lived sell-off in mid-March / early April after the Trump administration's announcement of broad "reciprocal" tariffs. Subsequent delays, negotiations and easing tensions led to renewed bullish sentiment that was also helped by resilient corporate earnings. Global central banks mostly held steady as it relates to interest rates, and market participants are closely watching economic data for indications of future policy changes.

During the first half of 2025, we exited our existing position Novo Nordisk and initiated a new position in Oracle. The motivation for the Novo Nordisk exit was a better opportunity elsewhere. As for Oracle, we believe the company is well positioned to capture continued growth in cloud and AI infrastructure as it transitions from a legacy SaaS/database provider for enterprises. The business has been executing well as it maintains attractive margins, and we believe the company will be a key leader in the next wave of enterprise AI/cloud technology.

Our investment horizon is best measured in years, conceivably decades, not months or quarters. Our focus continues to be on identifying what we believe to be high-quality companies with sustainable competitive advantages, operating in industries with high barriers to entry and contributing to durable pricing power.

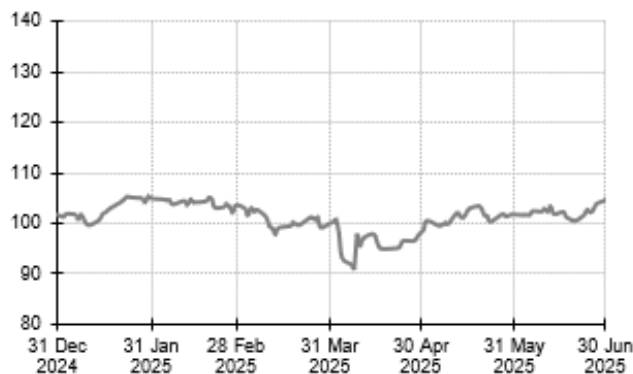

Despite pressures from the President Trump, the Federal Reserve held steady as it relates to policy changes, and market participants are closely watching economic data for indications of potential future easing.

During the first half of 2025, we exited our existing position in Becton Dickinson & Company. The motivation for the exit was challenged thesis. In our view, the company has made poor capital allocation decisions and compromised their focus on product safety and quality controls over the years. Sale proceeds were used to add to existing positions, Mettler-Toledo, Hilton and Copart.

Our focus continues to be on identifying what we believe to be high-quality companies with sustainable competitive advantages, operating in industries with high barriers to entry and contributing to durable pricing power.

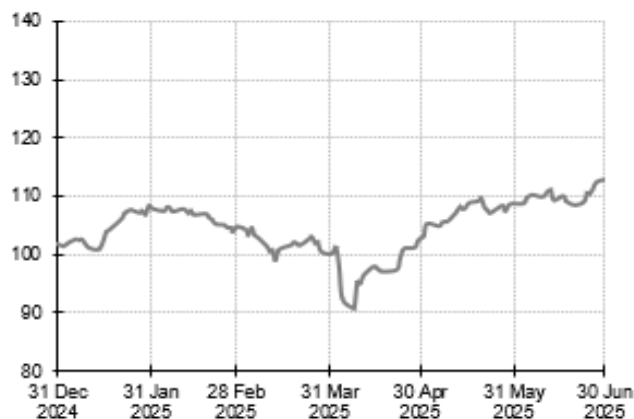

The first half of 2025 was marked by significant geopolitical and macroeconomic volatility, including the market shock triggered by “Liberation Day” and escalating tensions in the Middle East. Despite this challenging backdrop, equity markets delivered strong gains, and the Atlas Global Companies Fund B Class outperformed, returning +11.2% in USD terms. This compares favourably to the MSCI ACWI (+10.05%).

Our investment philosophy remains rooted in identifying high-quality businesses with durable competitive advantages, disciplined capital allocation, and long-term structural growth. These characteristics continue to drive superior compounding of fundamentals - what we refer to as structural alpha. This approach has delivered an annualised outperformance of +4.3% (gross) relative to the MSCI ACWI since inception.

Relative Performance in the first half was driven by strong stock selection. Veeva Systems, Amphenol and Diploma PLC were among the top contributors to performance.

Veeva Systems, which reported a 17% year-over-year increase in revenue and a 51% rise in operating income, reflecting strong execution and continued momentum in its life sciences cloud platforms.

Amphenol, which delivered record results with projected Q2 revenue growth of 48% year-over-year, supported by robust demand across IT datacom, defence, and mobile markets.

Diploma, a UK-listed industrial distributor, which posted 14% revenue growth and 23% EPS growth, underpinned by a differentiated, value-add model and disciplined capital deployment.

LVMH, Thermo Fisher and West Pharmaceutical detracted from performance.

LVMH, which faced headwinds from a softer luxury market and tariff-related volatility. While operational performance remained solid, we exited the position due to concerns around near-term brand refresh needs and consumer softness.

Thermo Fisher delivered strong results in early 2025, with solid revenue growth and improved earnings. However, despite the robust operational performance, its share price declined during the period. This was mainly due to investor concerns about broader sector volatility and short-term uncertainties around demand.

West Pharmaceutical detracted from performance in the first half of the year. Results saw the company encounter softer demand in its core injectable container markets and faced increased competition. Despite ongoing investment in innovation and operational efficiency, revenue growth was tempered by cyclical pressures in the healthcare sector and inventory normalisation among major clients, resulting in negative sentiment which drove its share price in the period.

Given the more challenging backdrop of an environment where profit growth becomes challenging, we believe companies that can grow their intrinsic worth should become more valuable over time. Therefore, we remain steadfast to our philosophy of investing in those companies with profitability, structural growth, predictability of cashflows and a competitive moat. The portfolio is well positioned to continue delivering strong fundamental returns, as demonstrated since the strategy's inception in 2017, and we remain confident in its long-term prospects. Our companies continue to exhibit superior fundamentals, with return on invested capital (ROIC) of 11.6% vs 6.0% for the benchmark, and gross margins of 61.9% vs 49.3%. The portfolio's interest cover of 16.2x and 3-year EBIT CAGR of 15.4% further underscore the quality and resilience of our holdings. Companies with strong competitive advantages and solid returns often strengthen their market position during volatile periods.

Looking ahead, we are optimistic. The portfolio is well-positioned to navigate ongoing volatility and to benefit from a market environment that increasingly rewards fundamentals. We continue to work diligently to enhance the portfolio and our pipeline remains strong, with 38 high-quality companies reviewed this year. We continue to enhance the portfolio incrementally, ensuring it reflects our philosophy and long-term return objectives.

During the six months ending 30th June 2025, the Fiera US Small-Mid Cap Growth Fund returned -2.6% (A Class USD) while its benchmark, the Russell 2500 Growth Index, returned -0.80%.

U.S. equities experienced a turbulent first half of 2025, shaped largely by ongoing uncertainty surrounding tariffs, taxes, inflation, interest rates and the AI boom. After a weak first quarter, markets rebounded in the second quarter, pushing major indices into positive territory for the year-to-date period. The S&P 500 posted a gain of 6.2%, while the Russell Midcap Index rose 4.84%. In contrast, small-cap stocks underperformed, with the Russell 2000 Index declining 1.79% over the six-month period.

The second quarter was marked by a strong resurgence in tech-heavy indices, particularly the Nasdaq, which surged more than 18% after falling over 10% in the first quarter. Investor concerns around AI began to ease as earnings generally met expectations. Mega-cap tech companies stood out in terms of profitability, boasting free cash flow margins of 20%, compared to just 5% for the broader market. However, questions remain about whether their significant investments in AI will ultimately deliver long-term returns. First-quarter earnings rose 10%, reinforcing the prevailing market narrative. For now, the market's focus appears to be on near-term earnings performance, largely ignoring potential changes in growth rates due to macroeconomic factors.

For the period, the Fiera US SMID Cap Growth Strategy underperformed its benchmark. Overall, this period proved particularly challenging from a security selection perspective relative to the benchmark as macro level factors and a myopic focus on AI seemingly outweighed company specific fundamentals in driving equity returns. Looking at results through a traditional attribution lens, the majority of underperformance was driven by stock selection while sector allocation also had a modest negative impact. From a sector standpoint, stock selection was strongest in industrials, followed by consumer discretionary and energy. However, strength in these areas was unable to offset challenging selection in the information technology and health care sectors.

At the stock level, the top contributors were industrial company BWX Technologies and DevSecOps software provider JFrog. BWX Technologies is an industry leader in nuclear technology which is seeing increasing applications and demand across its government, commercial and medical end markets. JFrog's offerings continue to gain traction as more organisations adopt their software distribution and security tools.

From a detractor standpoint, positions in tax compliance software solutions provider Vertex Inc. and biopharmaceutical company Sarepta Therapeutics had a dampening impact during the period. Despite delivering revenue and earnings that outstripped consensus, Vertex's stock price suffered as forward guidance disappointed investors. Meanwhile, Sarepta shares have suffered due to difficult setbacks with its flagship gene therapy, Elevidys, for Duchenne muscular dystrophy (DMD).

In 2025, policy changes related to immigration, tariffs and taxes have created significant uncertainty. The long-term impact of these changes remains unknown. The One Big Beautiful Bill Act (OBBA) is expected to provide a short-term boost but may become a long-term burden due to rising debt and interest costs. Estimates suggest that this bill could add 0.2–0.3% to GDP growth annually over the next three years. Tariffs are expected to have an inflationary effect in the short term as companies pass on the increased costs. Sectors such as tech hardware, biotech, pharma, utilities and transport are likely to benefit from tax changes.

The current market behavior aligns with expectations of decelerating GDP growth for the remainder of 2025. The market is pricing in inflation as transitory during the third quarter, with expectations of it decreasing afterward. The Federal Reserve is adopting a wait-and-see approach until it is confident that inflation is persistently softening before easing rates.

We are maintaining a diverse stance in our portfolio from a security, industry and sector standpoint. At the close of the second quarter, the strategy was exposed to eight of the 11 economic sectors and held its largest overweights to consumer discretionary and information technology and its largest underweights to health care and financials.

By anchoring portfolio construction around durable, hard-to-disrupt, secular growth trends and companies with sustainable growth and defensive business models, we believe the Fiera US Small-Mid Cap Growth Strategy is well-positioned to navigate additional bouts of market volatility.

Notes to the Financial Statements

1. General

Magna Umbrella Fund plc (the "Company") is an open-ended umbrella investment company with variable capital, incorporated under the Companies Act 2014 with registration number 277318. The Company was originally incorporated in Ireland as Regent Magna Europa Fund plc on 15 December 1997 and was renamed Magna Umbrella Fund plc by resolution of the members on 24 March 2003. As the Company is structured as an umbrella fund, it will comprise several funds each representing a separate portfolio of assets (each a "Fund", together the "Funds"). The share capital of the Company may also be divided into different classes with one or more classes of shares representing a Fund. Magna Umbrella Fund plc is the reporting entity.

The Company is authorised by the Central Bank of Ireland (the "Central Bank") as an Undertaking for Collective Investment in Transferable Securities ("UCITS") in accordance with the Companies Act 2014, the European Communities (Undertakings for Collective Investment in Transferable Securities) Regulations, 2011 (as amended) (the "UCITS Regulations") and the Central Bank (Supervision and Enforcement) Act 2013 (Section 48(1)) (Undertakings for Collective Investment in Transferable Securities) Regulations 2019 (the "Central Bank UCITS Regulations").

As at 30 June 2025, there were 8 active Funds (31 December 2024: 8 active Funds).

Segregated liability between Funds

In accordance with the prospectus of the Company (the "Prospectus"), the assets of each Fund are separate from one another and are invested separately in accordance with the investment objective and policies of each Fund. Whilst there is segregated liability between the Funds, a separate portfolio of assets is not maintained for each class of share.

1.1 Magna Eastern European Fund

The investment objective of Magna Eastern European Fund is to achieve capital growth by investment in a diversified portfolio consisting of Eastern European Securities, as defined in the Prospectus.

The investment objective of the Fund is achieved mainly by investing in equities and to a limited extent debt securities issued by, or in relation to, the securities of companies in countries of Eastern Europe or companies carrying out business in Eastern Europe, the majority of which are listed or traded on recognised exchanges, as defined or listed in the Prospectus ("Recognised Exchanges"). The Fund may also invest in financial derivative instruments ("FDIs") either for the purpose of investment or for the purpose of efficient portfolio management, within the conditions and limits laid down by the Central Bank, the Prospectus and the UCITS Regulations. It may also invest in low exercise price warrants or low strike price options or similar instruments.

The Fund is considered to be actively managed in reference to the MSCI EM Europe 10/40 Index (the "Benchmark") by virtue of the fact that it uses the Benchmark for performance comparison purposes. However, the Benchmark is not used to define the portfolio composition of the Fund or as a performance target and the Fund may be wholly invested in securities which are not constituents of the Benchmark.

The allocation of the Fund's assets will be determined by Fiera Capital (UK) Limited, the Fund's Investment Manager at its sole discretion and may vary according to market conditions. The Fund is managed with a bottom-up stock picking investment style and is subject to rigorous risk management process.

1.2 Magna Emerging Markets Fund

The investment objective of Magna Emerging Markets Fund was to achieve capital growth by investment in a diversified portfolio of Global Emerging Market Securities, as defined in the Prospectus.

The investment objective of the Fund was achieved mainly by investing in equities and to a limited extent, debt securities issued by, or in relation to, the equities and debt securities of companies in Global Emerging Countries or whose business was carried out in Global Emerging Countries which were listed or traded on Recognised Exchanges. Global Emerging Countries included any emerging market country where there was a Recognised Exchange, Hong Kong or any other country included in the MSCI Emerging Markets Index. The Fund also invested in FDIs either for the purpose of investment, hedging or for the purpose of efficient portfolio management, within the conditions and limits laid down by the Central Bank, the Prospectus and the UCITS Regulations. It also invested in low exercise price warrants or low strike price options or similar instruments.

The Fund was considered to be actively managed in reference to the MSCI Emerging Markets Index (the "Benchmark") by virtue of the fact that it used the Benchmark for performance comparison purposes. However, the Benchmark was not used to define the portfolio composition of the Fund or as a performance target and the Fund might have been wholly invested in securities which are not constituents of the Benchmark.

The allocation of the Fund's assets was determined by Fiera Capital (UK) Limited, the Fund's Investment Manager at its sole discretion and varied according to market conditions.

The Fund ceased its operations on 25 June 2024 following the receipt of requests for the redemption of all the Shares in issue in the Fund. The requests were satisfied by way of an in specie redemption of shares and transfer of assets. The in specie redemption of shares had an effective dealing date of 25 June 2024. The in specie transfer of assets had an effective trade date and settle date on 27 June 2024.

1.3 Magna MENA Fund

The investment objective of Magna MENA Fund is to achieve capital appreciation through investment in a portfolio consisting primarily of MENA Securities, as defined in the Prospectus.

1.3 Magna MENA Fund (continued)

The investment objective of the Fund is achieved mainly by investing in equities and to a limited extent debt securities issued by, or in relation to, the securities of companies in the Middle East and North Africa ("MENA"), the majority of which will be listed or traded on Recognised Exchanges and the companies located outside MENA who carry out business in MENA, all of which will be listed or traded on Recognised Exchanges. The MENA countries include but are not limited to Bahrain, Egypt, Jordan, Kuwait, Lebanon, Morocco, Oman, Qatar, Saudi Arabia, Tunisia and United Arab Emirates.

The Fund may also invest in FDIs either for the purpose of investment, hedging or for the purpose of efficient portfolio management, within the conditions and limits laid down by the Central Bank, the Prospectus and the UCITS Regulations. It may also invest in low exercise price warrants or low strike price options or similar instruments.

The Fund is considered to be actively managed in reference to the S&P Pan Arab Composite Index (the "Benchmark") by virtue of the fact that the performance fee payable to Fiera Capital (UK) Limited, the Fund's Investment Manager, is calculated based on the performance of the Fund against the Benchmark. However the Benchmark is not used to define the portfolio composition of the Fund or as a performance target and the Fund may be wholly invested in securities which are not constituents of the Benchmark.

The allocation of the Fund's assets will be determined by Fiera Capital (UK) Limited, the Fund's Investment Manager at its sole discretion and may vary according to market conditions.

1.4 Fiera Emerging Markets Fund

The investment objective of Fiera Emerging Markets Fund is to achieve total return by investing in a diversified portfolio of Global Emerging Market Securities. The Fund aims to provide a combination of income and long term capital growth. The Fund aims to provide a combination of income and long-term capital growth by investing in equities and debt securities issued by, or in relation to the securities of companies in Global Emerging Countries, the majority of which will be listed or traded on Recognised Exchanges. Investment in debt securities shall not exceed 15% of the Fund's total assets. The Fund may invest in unlisted securities, subject to the requirements of the Central Bank, the Prospectus and the UCITS Regulations.

The Fund is considered to be actively managed in reference to the MSCI Emerging Markets Index (the "Benchmark") by virtue of the fact that it uses the Benchmark for performance comparison purposes. However, the Benchmark is not used to define the portfolio composition of the Fund or as a performance target and the Fund may be wholly invested in securities which are not constituents of the Benchmark.

The allocation of the Fund's assets will be determined by Fiera Capital (UK) Limited, the Fund's Investment Manager at its sole discretion and may vary according to market conditions.

1.5 Magna New Frontiers Fund

The investment objective of Magna New Frontiers Fund is to achieve capital growth by investing in Global Frontier Market Securities, as defined in the Prospectus.

The Fund invests predominantly in the rapidly developing frontier markets of the world with opportunities anticipated to arise in the frontier markets of Europe, Africa, the Middle East, Central and South America and Asia on the basis that notwithstanding there has been economic progress in these markets, the Investment Manager believes there are opportunities for further growth and investment. The Fund aims to provide long-term capital growth by investing in equities and debt securities issued by, or in relation to the securities of companies, governments and government agencies in Global Frontier Countries.

The Fund is considered to be actively managed in reference to the MSCI Frontier Markets Free Net Total Return Index (the "Benchmark") by virtue of the fact that the performance fee payable to Fiera Capital (UK) Limited, the Fund's Investment Manager is calculated based on the performance of the Fund against the Benchmark. 1.6 Fiera Capital Global Equity Fund

The investment objective of Fiera Capital Global Equity Fund is to achieve superior and sustainable returns by investing in a long-only portfolio of global equities. The Fund's performance pursues its investment objective by investing in high quality companies. For performance monitoring purposes, the Fund would be measured against the MSCI World Index.

The MSCI World Index is a stock market index made up of approximately 1,600 global stocks (the "Index"). It is often used as a common benchmark for 'world' or 'global' stock funds. The Index comprises a collection of stocks of all the developed markets in the world, as defined by MSCI. The Index includes stocks from 23 countries but excludes stocks from emerging and frontier economies. Index results assume the re-investment of all dividends and capital gains.

The Fund intends to pursue the investment objective by investing in a portfolio of listed equities and holding them generally for an investment horizon of over 5 years.

1.6 Fiera Capital Global Equity Fund (continued)

The Fund is considered to be actively managed in reference to the MSCI World Net Index (the "Benchmark") by virtue of the fact that it uses the Benchmark for performance comparison purposes. However, the Benchmark is not used to define the portfolio composition of the Fund or as a performance target and the Fund may be wholly invested in securities which are not constituents of the Benchmark.

The allocation of the Fund's assets will be determined by Fiera Capital Corporation, the Fund's Investment Manager at its sole discretion and may vary according to market conditions.

1.7 Fiera Capital US Equity Fund

The investment objective of Fiera Capital US Equity Fund is to achieve superior and sustainable returns by investing in a long-only portfolio of U.S. equities. The Fund's performance pursues its investment objective by investing in high quality companies. For performance monitoring purposes, the Fund would be measured against the S&P 500 Index (the "Benchmark").

The Benchmark is an index of 500 stocks seen as a leading indicator of U.S. equities and a reflection of the performance of the large cap universe, made up of companies selected by economists. The Benchmark is a market value weighted index and one of the common benchmarks for the U.S. stock market. The Fund intends to pursue the investment objective by investing in a concentrated portfolio of listed equities and holding them generally for an investment horizon of over 5 years.

The Fund is considered to be actively managed in reference to the Benchmark by virtue of the fact that it uses the Benchmark for performance comparison purposes. However, the Benchmark is not used to define the portfolio composition of the Fund or as a performance target and the Fund may be wholly invested in securities which are not constituents of the Benchmark.

The allocation of the Fund's assets will be determined by Fiera Capital Corporation, the Fund's Investment Manager at its sole discretion and may vary according to market conditions.

1.8 Fiera Atlas Global Companies Fund

The investment objective of the Fund is to seek to deliver annualised double digit returns (10% or greater) before fees and costs, with lower risk of capital loss than broader global equity markets, over the long term.

Fiera Capital (UK) Limited, the Fund's Investment Manager, pursues the investment objective by employing an investment policy of investing in a portfolio of listed equities and holding them generally for an investment horizon of over 5 to 7 years. At least 51% of the assets of the Fund will be invested in stocks or other shares of corporations that are admitted for trading on a stock exchange or listed on another organised market.

For performance monitoring purposes, the Fund is measured against the MSCI All-Country World Index (the "Benchmark").

The Benchmark is a stock market index made up of approximately 1,600 global stocks. It is often used as a common benchmark for 'world' or 'global' stock funds. The Benchmark comprises a collection of stocks of all the developed markets in the world, as defined by MSCI. The Benchmark includes stocks from 23 countries but excludes stocks from emerging and frontier economies. Benchmark results assume the re-investment of all dividends and capital gains.

The Fund is considered to be actively managed in reference to the Benchmark by virtue of the fact that it uses the Benchmark for performance comparison purposes. However, the Benchmark is not used to define the portfolio composition of the Fund or as a performance target and the Fund may be wholly invested in securities which are not constituents of the Benchmark.

The allocation of the Fund's assets will be determined by Fiera Capital (UK) Limited, the Fund's Investment Manager at its sole discretion and may vary according to market conditions.

1.9 Fiera U.S. Small-Mid Cap Growth Fund

The investment objective of the Fund is to seek long-term capital growth and achieve superior returns by investing in a long-only portfolio of U.S. small cap and mid cap growth companies.

For performance monitoring purposes, the Fund would be measured against the Russell 2500 Growth (Net) Index (ticker: R25IG (the "Benchmark")).

The Benchmark measures the performance of the small to mid-cap growth segment of the US equity universe. It includes those Russell 2500 companies with relatively higher price-to-book ratios, higher forecast medium term (2 year) growth, as measured by the Institutional Brokers' Estimate System (I/B/E/S), and higher sales per share historical growth (5 years).

The Fund is considered to be actively managed in reference to the Benchmark by virtue of the fact that it uses the Benchmark for performance comparison purposes. However, the Benchmark is not used to define the portfolio composition of the Fund or as a performance target and the Fund may be wholly invested in securities which are not constituents of the Benchmark.

The allocation of the Fund's assets will be determined by Fiera Capital (UK) Limited, the Fund's Investment Manager at its sole discretion and may vary according to market conditions.

The Fund was launched on 21 June 2024.

2. Material accounting policies

The following is a summary of the significant accounting policies adopted by the Company:

2.1 Basis of preparation

The interim report and unaudited financial statements for the financial period from 1 January 2025 to 30 June 2025 have been prepared in accordance with International Accounting Standard ("IAS") 34, "Interim Financial Reporting", the UCITS Regulations and the Central Bank UCITS Regulations. The interim report and unaudited financial statements should be read in conjunction with the annual report and audited financial statements for the financial year ended 31 December 2024.

The significant accounting policies adopted by the Company for the financial period ended 30 June 2025 are consistent with those adopted for the financial year ended 31 December 2024.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of financial assets and financial liabilities classified at fair value through profit or loss.

The Company's management has made an assessment of the Company's ability to continue as a going concern and is satisfied that the Company has the resources to continue its business for the foreseeable future. Furthermore, management is not aware of any material uncertainties that may cast significant doubt upon the Company's ability to continue as a going concern. Therefore, the financial statements continue to be prepared on a going concern basis.

All references to net assets throughout the financial statements refer to net assets attributable to holders of redeemable participating shares, unless otherwise stated.

New accounting standards, amendments and interpretations in issue and effective for the financial period beginning on or after 1 January 2025

IAS 21 - Lack of Exchangeability

The objective of IAS 21 is to prescribe how to include foreign currency transactions and foreign operations in the financial statements of an entity and how to translate financial statements into a presentation currency. IAS 21 is effective for annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2025. There is no material impact from this amendment.

There are no other standards, amendments to standards or interpretations effective for annual period beginning on or after 1 January 2025 that have a material effect on the Company's financial statements.

Standards, amendments to existing standards and interpretations in issue but not yet effective

IFRS S1 - General requirements for disclosure of sustainability-related financial information

The objective of IFRS S1 is to require an entity to disclose information about its sustainability-related risks and opportunities that is useful to users of general-purpose financial reports in making decisions relating to providing resources to the entity. IFRS S1 requires an entity to disclose information about all sustainability-related risks and opportunities that could reasonably be expected to affect the entity's cash flows, its access to finance or cost of capital over the short, medium or long term (collectively referred to as 'sustainability-related risks and opportunities that could reasonably be expected to affect the entity's prospects'). IFRS S1 is effective for annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2024 with earlier application permitted as long as IFRS S2 Climate-related disclosures is also applied. This standard is subject to endorsement by local jurisdiction.

IFRS S2 - Climate-related disclosures

The objective of IFRS S2 is to require an entity to disclose information about its climate-related risks and opportunities that is useful to users of general-purpose financial reports in making decisions relating to providing resources to the entity. IFRS S2 requires an entity to disclose information about climate-related risks and opportunities that could reasonably be expected to affect the entity's cash flows, its access to finance or cost of capital over the short, medium or long term (collectively referred to as 'climate-related risks and opportunities that could reasonably be expected to affect the entity's prospects'). IFRS S2 is effective for annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2024 with earlier application permitted as long as IFRS S1 General Requirements for disclosure of sustainability-related financial information is also applied. This standard is subject to endorsement by local jurisdiction.

Amendments to IFRS 9 and IFRS 7 - Classification and Measurement of Financial Instruments

These amendments:

- clarify the requirements for the timing of recognition and derecognition of some financial assets and liabilities, with a new exception for some financial liabilities settled through an electronic cash transfer system;
- clarify and add further guidance for assessing whether a financial asset meets the sole payments of principal and interest (SPPI) criterion;
- add new disclosures for certain instruments with contractual terms that can change cash flows (such as some instruments with features linked to the achievement of environment, social and governance (ESG) targets); and
- make updates to the disclosures for equity instruments designated at Fair Value through Other Comprehensive Income (FVOCI).

The amendments apply for annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2026. The Company intends to adopt these amendments, if applicable, when they become effective.

IFRS 18 - Presentation and Disclosure in Financial Statements

This is the new standard on presentation and disclosure in financial statements, with a focus on updates to the statement of profit or loss. The key new concepts introduced in IFRS 18 relate to:

- the structure of the statement of profit or loss;
- required disclosures in the financial statements for certain profit or loss performance measures that are reported outside an entity's financial statements (that is, management defined performance measures); and
- enhanced principles on aggregation and disaggregation which apply to the primary financial statements and notes in general.

The new standard applies for annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2027. The new standard applies for annual reporting periods beginning on or after 1 January 2026. The Company intends to adopt this new standard, if applicable, when they become effective.

A number of new standards and amendments to standards are yet to be effective for annual period beginning after 1 January 2025 and earlier application is permitted; however, the Company has not early adopted any of the forthcoming new or amended standards in preparing these interim report and unaudited financial statements as they are not expected to have a significant impact on the Company.

2.2 Use of judgements and estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with IFRS requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the reporting date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the financial period. Actual results could differ from those estimates. The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to estimates are made prospectively.

Judgements

Information about judgements made in applying accounting policies that have the most significant effects on the amounts recognised in the financial statements largely relate to the translation into functional and presentation currencies. Also, the Pricing Committee uses a variety of techniques and makes assumptions that are based on market conditions existing at each reporting date. This is a judgement used in preparing the financial statements.

Assumptions and estimation uncertainties

Information about assumptions and estimation uncertainties that have a significant risk of resulting in a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the financial period are discussed below within "Fair value measurement principles" in note 2.3 and included in note 11 of the Notes to the Financial Statements and relate to the determination of fair value of financial instruments with significant unobservable inputs.

The Directors believe that the estimates utilised in preparing these financial statements are reasonable and prudent.

Notes to the Financial Statements (continued)

2. Material accounting policies (continued)

2.3 Fair value measurement principles

Financial instruments are measured initially at fair value (transaction price), plus, in the case of financial assets or financial liabilities not at fair value through profit or loss, transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of the financial asset or financial liability. Transaction costs on financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss are expensed immediately. Subsequent to initial recognition, all instruments classified at fair value through profit or loss are measured at fair value with changes in their value recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

Financial liabilities arising from the redeemable participating shares issued by the Company are carried at the redemption amount representing the investor's right to a residual interest in the Company's assets.

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date in the principal or, in its absence, the most advantageous market to which the Funds have access at that date. The fair value of a liability reflects its non-performance risk.

The fair value of financial instruments traded in active markets (such as publicly traded derivatives and trading securities) is based on quoted market prices or, for non-exchange traded instruments, sourced from a reportable broker/counterparty, at the reporting date without any deduction for estimated future selling costs. A market is regarded as "active" if transactions for the asset or liability take place with sufficient frequency and volume to provide pricing information on an ongoing basis. The Funds measure instruments quoted in an active market at the closing mid-market price, because this price provides a reasonable approximation of the exit price. If there is no quoted price in an active market, then the Funds use valuation techniques that maximise the use of relevant observable inputs and minimise the use of unobservable inputs. Investments in collective investment schemes are valued at the latest available bid price or net asset value of the units as published by the relevant collective investment scheme.

The Funds may invest in warrants. Warrants which are fully paid up and have a zero strike price exhibit the identical risk and return characteristics as in the case where the Fund has acquired the underlying security (in most cases equity) directly. Such warrants are valued at the closing mid-market price for the underlying equity quoted on the stock exchange or principal market on which it is listed or, if the closing mid-market price is unavailable or unrepresentative, the last available close of business/last traded price on such stock exchange or market.

Participatory notes ("P-Notes") are financial instruments usually issued by a broker such as an investment bank which provides an investor with an indirect exposure to an organisation's financial instrument that they would otherwise not have been able to invest in directly. The value of a P-Note is generally based on the value of the underlying security to which it is linked. Certain Funds may invest in P-Notes which may be listed or unlisted and will be used to gain exposure to certain countries. These investments are measured at fair value based on the closing mid-market price as at the valuation point on the financial period end date or the last traded price, when no closing mid-market price is available for the underlying security with any changes in their values recognised in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

The Funds may from time to time invest in financial instruments that are not traded in an active market (for example in unlisted securities). The fair value is estimated by using valuation techniques. The Board of Directors (the "Board") has authorised a pricing committee convened by Fiera Capital (UK) Limited, Fiera Capital Corporation and Fiera Capital Inc. (each "Investment Manager", together the "Investment Managers") and approved by The Bank of New York Mellon SA/NV, Dublin Branch (the "Depositary") as the competent person (the "Pricing Committee") to recommend the fair value for such unlisted securities to BNY Mellon Fund Services (Ireland) Designated Activity Company (the "Administrator").

The Pricing Committee uses a variety of techniques and makes assumptions that are based on market conditions existing at each reporting date. The Pricing Committee consists or has consisted of Mr. Anderson Whamond (Director) (up to the date of his resignation), Catherine O'Reilly (Director) (up to the date of her resignation), and representatives from each of the Investment Manager, its Compliance Department, and its Operations and Trading Departments. A minimum of two members meet at least once every month to review all unlisted securities and determine the valuation policy for these instruments. Minutes are taken by the secretary of all meetings which are circulated to the Administrator and are subsequently approved and ratified by the Board.

2.3 Fair value measurement principles (continued)

Included in Fiera Emerging Markets Fund's and Magna New Frontiers Fund's portfolios are investments in common stock and closed-end fund whose country of risk is Vietnam. As a result of Vietnam's foreign ownership restrictions coupled with the maximum authorised shares in issue, shares in certain securities may trade in a local market and a foreign market. Owing to the limitation in the shares available, shares in the foreign market typically trade at a premium to the local price. At each reporting date, the price for positions subject to foreign ownership restrictions is estimated by identifying the principal market for the securities and in the absence of a single principal market, the most advantageous market. The price at each reporting date is based on observable inputs from those markets and is estimated by the Pricing Committee. Please refer to note 11 of the Notes to the financial statements for further details.

3. Share capital

The authorised share capital of the Company is US\$60,000 divided into 60,000 (non-participating) subscriber shares of a par value of US\$1 each and 500,000,000,000 participating shares of no par value ("Redeemable Participating shares"). The Redeemable Participating shares are available for issue to shareholders. The issued and fully paid subscriber share capital is 7 shares at US\$1 per share. The subscriber shares carry no voting rights while the Redeemable Participating shares carry voting rights and are entitled to all dividend and capital surplus rights. Further information on the rights, preferences and restrictions of each share class is available in the Prospectus. Note 6.1 of the Notes to the Financial Statements includes details of the different fee rates applicable to each share class. The Statement of Financial Position and the Statement of Changes in Net Assets Attributable to Holders of Redeemable Participating Shares deal only with the Redeemable Participating shares and do not include the subscriber shares. The Company's capital currently exceeds €300,000 being the capital required to establish a self-managed investment company under the UCITS Regulations.

4. Deposits with credit institutions, bank overdrafts and margin cash (due from and to brokers)

As at 30 June 2025 and 31 December 2024, all cash balances and bank overdrafts with the exception of some margin cash balances were held by the Depositary. Margin cash was held for derivatives trading with the following counterparties and is disclosed within amounts due from and to brokers in the Statement of Financial Position:

The performance fee for the G, H Dist, N and R Class Shares shall equal a rate of 20 percent of the return on the G, H Dist, N and R Class Shares in excess of the percentage return on the S&P Pan Arab Composite (the "benchmark rate") subject to the relevant benchmark net asset value per share as at the last dealing day in the relevant accounting period, multiplied by the weighted average number of shares of each relevant class in issue during the accounting period as at the last dealing day or, in the case of (b) above, the number of shares of each relevant class being redeemed during the period by reference to which the fee is payable. The weighted average number of shares is calculated by taking the number of shares outstanding each day in the period divided by the total number of days in that period. Due to the use of averaging in calculating the performance fee the economic effect of the performance fee in respect of the G, H Dist, N and R Class Shares on a per share basis may substantially differ from the effective rate.

The performance fee shall be payable in respect of the performance of the G, H Dist, N and R Class Shares during an accounting period. Any underperformance of the G, H Dist, N and R Class Shares in respect of the S&P Pan Arab Composite in preceding accounting periods shall be cleared before a performance fee is payable in the relevant accounting period.

The performance fee is payable annually in arrears in respect of each accounting period. Each accounting period will end on 31 December each year.

The "benchmark net asset value per share" shall be the net asset value per share following the close of the previous accounting period in which a performance fee was payable multiplied by the benchmark rate since the close of the previous accounting period in which a performance fee was payable. If no performance fee was payable in any previous accounting period, the benchmark net asset value per share shall be the initial issue price for that share at inception adjusted by the benchmark rate.

For the purpose of calculating the performance fee, the net asset value per share is calculated after deducting the management fees referred to above but without accounting for the relevant performance fee then payable. All management and performance fees are verified by the Depositary prior to payment once the Depositary has received all information to enable it to verify same.

Magna New Frontiers Fund

The Investment Manager shall be entitled to receive a performance fee in respect of the G, N, R, D Dist, S Dist and T Dist Class Shares, calculated and payable on the calculation day. This fee accrues monthly and shall be calculated using the same methodology as Magna MENA Fund.

The performance fee is payable annually in arrears in respect of each accounting period. Each accounting period will end on 31 December each year. In respect of the first calculation period, the calculation of the performance fee shall commence on the closing of the initial offer period for each of the D Dist, S Dist and T Dist Class Shares and shall end on the next calculation day.

The performance fee for the G, N, R, D Dist, S Dist and T Dist Class Shares shall equal a rate of 20 percent of the return on the G, N, R, D Dist, S Dist and T Dist Class Shares (including any dividends declared in respect of the D Dist, S Dist and T Dist) in excess of the percentage return on the MSCI Frontier Markets Free Net Total Return Index in Euros (the "benchmark rate") subject to the relevant benchmark net asset value per share as at the calculation day in the relevant accounting period, multiplied by the weighted average number of shares of each relevant class in issue during the accounting period as at the last dealing day or, in the case of (b) above, the number of shares of each relevant class being redeemed during the period by reference to which the fee is payable. The weighted average number of shares is calculated by taking the number of shares outstanding each day in the period divided by the total number of days in that period. Due to the use of averaging in calculating the performance fee the economic effect of the performance fee in respect of the G, N, R, D Dist, S Dist and T Dist Class Shares on a per share basis may substantially differ from the effective rate.

The performance fee shall be payable in respect of the performance of the G, N, R, D Dist, S Dist and T Dist Class Shares during an accounting period. Any underperformance of the G, N, R, D Dist, S Dist and T Dist Class Shares in respect of the Morgan Stanley Capital International Frontier Markets Free Net Total Return Index in Euros in preceding accounting periods shall be cleared before a performance fee is payable in the relevant accounting period.

For the purpose of calculating performance of the D Dist Class shares, performance is adjusted to account for all dividends previously declared.

The Investment Manager in respect of one or more classes may waive its entitlement to receive a performance fee at its discretion.

The performance fee calculation will be verified by the Depositary.

For the purpose of calculating the performance fee in respect of the G, N, R, D Dist, S Dist and T Dist Class Shares, the net asset value per share is calculated after deducting the management fees referred to above but without accounting for the relevant performance fee then payable. All management and performance fees are verified by the Depositary prior to payment once the Depositary has received all information to enable it to verify same.

6.2 Management Company fee

The Manager is entitled to charge the Company an annual fee based on a combined AUM across the Company and another UCITS managed by the Investment Manager, namely, OAKS Emerging Umbrella Fund ("OAKS") as follows:

- 1.75 bps of AUM per annum €0 - €500M
- 1.50 bps of AUM per annum €500M - €1BN
- 0.75bps of AUM per annum €1BN+

The above will be subject to a minimum annual fee not to exceed €80,000 across the Company and OAKS. The Management Company's fee shall be subject to the imposition of VAT if required. The fee is calculated and accrued daily and is payable monthly in arrears. The Management Company's fee may be waived or reduced by the Manager, in consultation with the Directors.

The Manager is also entitled to be repaid all of its out-of-pocket expenses (including VAT thereon) out of the assets of the relevant Funds.

For the financial period ended 30 June 2025, total Management Company fees amounted to €110,859 (30 June 2024: €111,694).

The Company pays Bridge Fund Services Limited for the provision of MLRO services. For the financial period ended 30 June 2025, total fees for these services amounted to €1,250 (30 June 2024: €2,750) which is disclosed within the statutory, professional and legal expenses in the Statement of Comprehensive Income. These fees are exclusive of VAT.

6.3 Depositary fees

The Funds pay the Depositary a fee of up to 0.01% per annum of the average net assets of the relevant Fund up to US\$1 billion, 0.0075% per annum of the next US\$1 billion of the average net assets of the relevant Fund and 0.0065% of the average net assets of the relevant Fund in excess of US\$2 billion.

The Depositary is also entitled to reimbursement of all reasonable out-of-pocket expenses properly incurred by it in the performance of its duties and responsibilities. The Depositary also charges each Fund for all safekeeping charges incurred by its sub-custodian plus transaction fees, stamp duties, scrip charges, registration fees and special taxes plus any ad hoc administration costs. The minimum fee payable to the Depositary for global custody has been set at US\$6,250 per month, with account maintenance of US\$30 per custody account. For the financial period ended 30 June 2025, total Depositary fees amounted to €871,498 (30 June 2024: €726,689).

6.4 Administrator fee

The Administrator is entitled to a fee, payable monthly in arrears, in relation to administration and accounting services at a rate of up to 0.0325% per annum of the first US\$1 billion of the average net assets of the relevant Fund, 0.025% per annum of the next US\$1 billion of the average net assets of the relevant Fund, 0.0175% per annum of the next US\$1.5 billion of the average net assets of the relevant Fund and 0.0075% of the average net assets of the relevant Fund in excess of US\$3.5 billion.

For the financial period ended 30 June 2025, this fee amounted to €415,652 (30 June 2024: €408,038).

Each Fund also pays to the Administrator an amount of US\$1,000 per share class per annum out of its own assets and for services provided in relation to shareholder and transfer agency services which shall be accrued daily for the relevant Fund together with any VAT, if applicable.

The Funds also pay to the Administrator a shareholder account administration fee which is US\$27.69 per investor per annum with additional dealing fees charged for processing deals and wire transfer. The Administrator is also entitled to be repaid all of its reasonable out-of-pocket expenses properly incurred by it in the performance of its duties and responsibilities, which shall include technology costs related to internet services to be provided to the Funds, transaction charges related to share purchases/redemptions, legal expenses, courier and telecommunication costs.

For the financial period ended 30 June 2025, this fee amounted to €98,068 (30 June 2024: €97,632).

6.5 Directors' fees

The Company shall pay the Directors such annual remuneration for acting as Directors of the Company as the Directors may from time to time agree, provided however that the annual remuneration of the Directors shall not, in aggregate, exceed €200,000. Such fees shall be payable quarterly in arrears and shall be apportioned pro rata amongst the Funds. The Organisational Effectiveness Director is entitled to an annual fee of €5,000. The Directors shall also be entitled to reimbursement of any reasonable expenses incurred by them in the performance of their duties.

For the financial period ended 30 June 2025, the Directors' fee amounted to €79,300 (30 June 2024: €79,769). For the financial period ended 30 June 2025, Directors' expenses incurred by the Funds amounted to €1,451 (30 June 2024: €1,533). All expenses paid to the Directors were non-taxable in line with Section 305 of the Companies Act 2014.

For the financial periods ended 30 June 2025 and 30 June 2024, there were no other remuneration or expenses paid to the Directors, apart from that outlined above.

7. Distributions

The Funds are capital appreciation funds and it is not intended that they will pay dividends with the exception of the following distributing classes: H Dist of Magna MENA Fund, B Dist, N Dist and R Dist Class Shares of Fiera Emerging Markets Fund, D Dist and S Dist Class Shares of Magna New Frontiers Fund and A Dist and I FC Dist Class Shares of Fiera Atlas Global Companies Fund (the "distributing share classes"). The distributing share classes shall, if applicable, pay distributions in respect of each financial year and half-yearly financial period as may from time to time be determined by the Directors, in their absolute discretion. Such distributions in respect of the distributing share classes shall be paid within six months of the relevant accounting date or half-yearly accounting date as appropriate. The amount of the distribution (if any) for any financial year or half-yearly financial period as appropriate shall be determined by the Directors and any sums not distributed will be accumulated and reflected in the net asset value of the distributing share classes as appropriate. Any distribution paid will be out of net income, less accrued expenses.

The B, B Acc, B Dist, C, D Dist, I, G, J, N, N Acc, N Dist, O, R, R Acc, R Dist and Z Class Shares of each Fund are classified as Reporting Funds under the United Kingdom tax authority's reporting fund regime.

It is intended that any distribution made in respect of C, G, N and R Class Shares, if applicable, shall be declared in general meeting, which will typically be called within four months from the end of the relevant accounting period and shall be paid within six months from the end of the relevant accounting period.

It is not intended that application will be made to obtain classification under the reporting fund regime for the H or S Class Shares. Shareholders holding H or S Class Shares are advised however that income attributable to the H or S Class Shares shall be the net income attributable to the H or S Class Shares after deduction of expenses in the same manner as income attributable to the B Dist, C, N, R, N Dist, R Dist, S Dist and T Dist Class Shares is calculated.

Any distributions, which remain unclaimed for six years from the date on which they become payable, shall be forfeited and shall become assets of the relevant Fund.

Equalisation is operated in relation to the distributing Funds so that the amount distributed is the same for all shares of the same type notwithstanding different dates of issue. Equalisation amounts on subscriptions and redemptions are included in the amounts attributable for distributions.

8. Taxation

The Company is an investment undertaking as defined in Section 739B of the Taxes Consolidation Act, 1997. Therefore, it will not be liable to Irish tax on its income or gains, other than on the occurrence of a chargeable event. A chargeable event includes any distribution payments to shareholders or any encashment, redemption or transfer of shares or the ending period for which the investment was held.

Generally a chargeable event arises on any distribution, redemption, repurchase, cancellation, transfer of shares or on the ending of a "Relevant Period", "Relevant Period" being an eight year period beginning with the acquisition of the shares by the shareholder, and each subsequent period of eight years beginning immediately after the preceding Relevant Period.

A gain or chargeable event does not arise in respect of:

- (i) a shareholder who is not an Irish resident and not ordinarily resident in Ireland at the time of the chargeable event, provided the necessary signed statutory declarations are held by the Company;
- (ii) certain exempted Irish tax resident investors who have provided the Company with the necessary signed statutory declarations;
- (iii) an exchange of shares arising on a qualifying amalgamation or reconstruction of the Company with another fund;
- (iv) any transactions in relation to shares held in a recognised clearing system as designated by order of the Revenue Commissioners of Ireland;
- (v) certain exchanges between spouses and former spouses on the occasion of judicial separation and/or divorce; or
- (vi) an exchange by a shareholder, effected by way of an arm's length bargain where no payment is made to the shareholder of the shares in the Company for other shares in the Company.

The Company is exposed to tax risks with regard to the imposition of taxes in the jurisdictions in which it invests (including but not limited to capital gains tax and withholding tax), and has put in place a process for the identification of its obligations in this regard including periodic updates to its tax database and external, third party validation of this database at regular intervals.

In the absence of an appropriate declaration, the Company will be liable to Irish tax on the occurrence of a chargeable event, and the Company reserves its right to withhold such taxes from the relevant shareholders.

Capital gains, dividends and interest (if any) received on investment made by the Company may be subject to withholding taxes imposed by the country from which the investment income/gains are received and such taxes may not be recoverable by the Company or its shareholders.

The dividend withholding tax charge for the financial period ended 30 June 2025 was €2,492,428 (30 June 2024: €3,098,930), of which €196,127 was outstanding as at 30 June 2025 (31 December 2024: €198,754). The capital gains tax charge for the financial period ended 30 June 2025 was €Nil (30 June 2024: €667,000), of which €Nil was outstanding as at 30 June 2025 (31 December 2024: €2,527).

9. Related party transactions

According to IAS 24 Related Parties, parties are considered to be related if one party has the ability to control the other party or exercise significant influence over the other party in making financial or operational decisions or is a member of the key management personnel of the reporting entity or of a parent of the reporting entity. The Directors, the Investment Manager and the Manager are considered as key management personnel. Details of fees charged during the current and prior financial periods are disclosed in note 6 of the Notes to the Financial Statements. Fiera Capital (Europe) Limited is the parent company of Fiera Capital (UK) Limited, the Investment Manager, Sponsor and Share Distributor. Fiera Capital (Europe) Limited and the Investment Managers, Sponsor and Share Distributor are all considered related parties.

Effective 21 May 2025, Catherine O'Reilly resigned as a Director of Fiera (IOM) Limited and Fiera Capital (UK) Limited. As at 30 June 2025, Mark Bickford-Smith held 36,585 R Dist Class Shares of Fiera Emerging Markets Fund (31 December 2024: 36,585).

As at 30 June 2025 and 31 December 2024, other than as stated above, no other Directors held any interest in the Company.

As at 30 June 2025, Fiera Emerging Markets Equity Fund, on behalf of Fiera Capital Corporation, held 3,358,940 I Class Shares of Fiera Emerging Markets Fund (31 December 2024: 3,715,217).

In accordance with the requirements of the Central Bank UCITS Regulations, any transaction carried out with the Company by a management company, depositary, delegates or sub-delegates and/or associated or group companies of these entities ("connected persons") must be carried out as if negotiated at arm's length. Such transactions must be in the best interests of the shareholders.

In addition to those transactions, there are also transactions carried out by connected persons on behalf of the Company to which the Directors have no direct access and in respect of which the Directors must rely upon assurances from its delegates that the connected persons carrying out these transactions do carry them out on a similar basis.

As required under the Central Bank UCITS Regulations, the Directors, as responsible persons are satisfied that there are arrangements in place, evidenced by written procedures, to ensure that the obligations that are prescribed by the Central Bank UCITS Regulations are applied to all transactions with a connected person; and all transactions with connected persons that were entered into during the financial period to which the report relates complied with the obligations that are prescribed by the Central Bank UCITS Regulations.

Note 9 of the Notes to the Financial Statements details related party transactions in the financial period as required by IAS 24. However, shareholders should understand that not all "connected persons" are related parties as such latter expression is defined by IAS 24. Details of fees paid to related parties and certain connected persons are set out in Notes 6 and 9 of the Notes to the Financial Statements.

11. Fair value estimation

IFRS 13 requires the Company to classify fair value measurements using a fair value hierarchy that reflects the significance of the inputs used in making the measurements.

Investments measured and reported at fair value are classified and disclosed in one of the following fair value hierarchy levels based on the significance of the inputs used in measuring its fair value:

Level 1 inputs are unadjusted quoted prices in active markets for identical assets or liabilities that the reporting entity has the ability to access at the valuation date. An active market for the asset or liability is a market in which transactions for the asset or liability occur with sufficient frequency and volume to provide pricing information on an ongoing basis.

Level 2 inputs are inputs other than quoted prices in active markets included within level 1 that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly. Fair value is determined through the use of models, other valuation methodologies or where quoted prices are used but the market is not active.

Notes to the Financial Statements (continued)

11. Fair value estimation (continued)

Level 2 inputs include the following:

- Quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets.
- Quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in markets that are not active, that is, markets in which there are few transactions for the asset or liability, the prices are not current, or price quotations vary substantially either over time or among market makers, or in which little information is released publicly.
- Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability (e.g. interest rate and yield curves observable at commonly quoted intervals, volatilities, prepayment speeds, loss severities, credit risks and default rates).
- Inputs that are derived principally from or corroborated by observable market data by correlation or other means.

Level 3 inputs are unobservable inputs for the asset or liability. Unobservable inputs reflect the Pricing Committee's assumptions about how market participants would be expected to value the asset or liability. Unobservable inputs are developed based on the best information available in the circumstances, other than market data obtained from sources independent of the Funds and might include a Fund's own data.

An investment is always categorised as Level 1, 2 or 3 in its entirety. In certain cases, the fair value measurement for an investment may use a number of different inputs that fall into different levels of the fair value hierarchy. In such cases, an investment's level within the fair value hierarchy is based on the lowest level of input that is significant to the fair value measurement. The assessment of the significance of a particular input to the fair value measurement requires judgment and is specific to the investment.

For all other assets and liabilities including cash and cash equivalents and net assets attributable to holders of redeemable participating shares, their carrying values are a reasonable approximation of fair value. As such, Level 1 is deemed to be the most appropriate categorisation for cash and Level 2 is deemed to be the most appropriate categorisation for all other assets and liabilities.

Investments in Fiera Emerging Markets Fund and Magna New Frontiers Fund include common stock and closed-end fund whose country of risk is Vietnam. As a result of Vietnam's foreign ownership restrictions coupled with the maximum authorised shares in issue, shares in certain securities may trade in a local market and a foreign market. Owing to the limitation in the shares available, shares in the foreign market typically trade at a premium to the local price.

At each reporting date, the price for positions subject to foreign ownership restrictions is estimated by identifying the principal market for the securities and in the absence of a single principal market, the most advantageous market. The price at each reporting date is based on observable inputs from those markets and is estimated by the Pricing Committee. As at 30 June 2025 and 31 December 2024, no premium over the local price was applied to the positions.

Unobservable inputs are used to measure fair value to the extent that relevant observable inputs are not available, thereby allowing for situations in which there is little, if any, market activity for the asset or liability at the measurement date. However, the fair value measurement objective remains the same, i.e. an exit price from the perspective of a market participant that holds the asset or owes the liability. Therefore, unobservable inputs shall reflect the assumptions that market participants would use when pricing the asset or liability, including assumptions about risk.

There is no level 3 instrument for the period ended 30 June 2025 and table below presents the movement in Level 3 instruments for the financial year ended 31 December 2024.

12. Use of financial derivatives instruments ("FDIs")

Where considered appropriate, the Company may utilise instruments such as futures, options, contracts for difference, swaps and forward currency contracts for efficient portfolio management and/or to protect against exchange risks within the conditions and limits laid down by the Central Bank from time to time. For UCITS which have engaged in efficient portfolio management techniques, disclosures are required in accordance with the requirements of the Central Bank UCITS Regulations. A UCITS is required to disclose the revenues arising from repurchase agreements and stock lending transactions for the entire reporting period together with the direct and indirect operational costs and fees incurred. During the financial period ended 30 June 2025 and financial year ended 31 December 2024, the Funds did not enter into repurchase agreements and did not engage in stock lending activities. A description of the use of FDIs is set out below.

The Funds may enter into forward currency contracts to purchase or sell a specific currency at a future date at a price set at the time of the contract. The Funds may enter into these contracts to hedge against changes in currency exchange rates. The Funds may use one currency (or a basket of currencies) to hedge against adverse changes in the value of another currency (or a basket of currencies) when exchange rates between the two currencies are positively correlated. The underlying exposure on forward currency contracts as at 30 June 2025 and the corresponding counterparty are contained in the relevant Schedules of Investments.

The Investment Managers may take a temporary defensive position when the securities trading markets or the economy are experiencing excessive volatility, a prolonged general decline, or other adverse conditions. The Funds may invest in different transferable securities such as U.S. government securities, short term indebtedness, and money market instruments issued or guaranteed by any Member State, its local authorities, non-Member States or public international body of which one or more Member States are members subject to and in accordance with the requirements of the Central Bank and the Regulations or other investment grade cash equivalents. When the Funds are in a defensive investment position, they may not achieve their investment objective.

The Funds enter into contracts with a market maker whereby the market maker notionally buys or sells a specified security from/to the Funds. An unfunded contract for difference is an agreement between the Funds and third parties which allow the Funds to acquire an exposure to the price movement of specific securities without actually purchasing the securities. Upon entering into an unfunded contract for difference, the Funds are required to deposit with a broker an initial cash margin equal to a certain percentage of the contract amount. Variation margin payments are made or received by the Funds depending upon the fluctuation in the value of the underlying securities. Price movements against contract values are recorded as unrealised gains or losses while the contract is open and the Funds crystallise a realised gain or loss when the contract is closed. The underlying exposure on contracts for difference as at 30 June 2025 and the corresponding counterparty are disclosed in the relevant Schedules of Investments.

Realised and unrealised gains and losses arising from the use of financial derivative instruments are included in the Statement of Comprehensive Income.

12. Soft Commission and Commission Sharing Arrangements

There have been no soft commission or commission sharing arrangements affecting the Company during the financial periods ended 30 June 2025 and 30 June 2024.

Such provision will be added to the price at which shares will be issued in the case of net subscription requests exceeding 1% of the net asset value of the Fund and deducted from the price at which shares will be redeemed in the case of net redemption requests exceeding 1% of the net asset value of the Fund.

The Investment Managers may in addition, apply a provision for market spreads and duties and charges in any other case where it considers such a provision to be in the best interests of the Fund. Any such sum will be paid into the account of the relevant Fund.
